

ANNUAL NOTICES – 2022-23 School Year

Each year Federal and State Law requires that we inform the residents of our school district of certain specific items.

SCREENINGS

Annually the school district conducts physical exams or screenings on students. The school nurse will conduct these screenings:

- Vision and Hearing Screening in Grades K, 1, 3, 5, and 9
- Vision Screening in Grade 7
- Scoliosis Screening in Grades 6, 7, 8

In addition, new students may be screened.

Any other physical exams or screenings require prior notification to parents.

CONSTITUTIONALLY PROTECTED PRAYER

The Hillsdale Local Board of Education does not have, nor will it adopt any policies that deny or prevent participation in constitutionally protected school prayer.

FUND-RAISERS

Any group or organizations (school or community) that wishes to solicit funds or conduct fund-raisers on school property must first obtain permission from the Superintendent or designee. All required paper must be in place prior to any fundraiser.

MMR VACCINE

MMR Vaccine is required for all students entering the 7th grade. This must be done prior to the start of the school year. All immunization requirements are available on our website.

ASBESTOS

This management plan is on file and available for inspection in the office of the Superintendent and in each of the buildings within our school system.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS...TITLE I PROGRAMS

It is the practice of this school district to consult with parents, teachers, administrators, and other interested persons in the design, planning, and implementation of our Title I Reading Programs. NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS FOR ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the School receives a request for access. Parents or eligible students should submit to the School principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The School official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading. Parents or eligible students may ask the School to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the School principal and clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the School decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the School will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception,

which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the School as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the School has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the School discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. The School will forward student records upon request.

The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the School to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA) NOTICE FOR DIRECTORY INFORMATION

The *FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT* (FERPA), a Federal Law, requires that Hillsdale Local School District, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Hillsdale Local School District may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the district to the contrary in accordance with district procedures. The primary purpose of the directory information is to allow the Hillsdale Local School District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor Roll or other recognition lists;
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheet, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.
- Local Report Card distribution to parents.

Directory information, which is information that is generally considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings, or publish yearbooks. In addition, two Federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the *ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION ACT OF 1965* (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories – names, addresses and telephone listings – unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

If you do not want Hillsdale Local School District to disclose any or all items as directory information from your child's education records without prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing within two weeks of this notice. Hillsdale Local School District has designated the following information as directory information:

These laws are: Section 9528 of the ESEA (20 U.S.C. 7908), as amended by the *NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND ACT OF 2001* (P.L. 107-110), education bill, and 10 U.S.C. 503 as amended by session 544, *THE NATIONAL DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION ACT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2002* (P.L. 107-110), the legislation that provides funding for the Nation's Armed Forces.

NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS UNDER THE PROTECTION OF PUPIL RIGHTS AMENDMENT (PPRA)

PPRA affords parents and students who are 18 or emancipated minors (“eligible students”) certain rights regarding our conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams. These include the right to:

- **Consent** before students are required to submit to a survey that concerns one or more of the following protected areas (“protected information survey”) if the survey is funded in whole or in part by a program of the U.S. Department of Education (ED)-
 1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student’s parent;
 2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student’s family;
 3. Sex behavior or attitudes;
 4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
 5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have closed family relationship;
 6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
 7. Religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or parents; or
 8. Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.
- **Receive notice and an opportunity to opt a student out of funding:**
 1. Any other protected information survey, regardless of funding;
 2. Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attendance, administered by the school or its agent, and not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of a student, except for hearing, vision, or scoliosis screenings, or any physical exam or screening permitted or required under State law; and
 3. Activities involving collection, disclosure, or use of

personal information obtained from students for marketing or to sell or otherwise distribute the information to others.

- **Inspect**, upon request and before administration or use -
 1. Protected information surveys of students;
 2. Instruments used to collect personal information from students for any of the above marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes; and
 3. Instructional material used as part of the educational curriculum.

The School District has policies regarding these rights, as well as arrangements to protect student privacy in the administration of protected surveys and the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes. (The School District will directly notify parents and eligible students of these policies at least annually at the start of each school year) and after any substantive changes. The School District will also directly notify parents and eligible students, such as through U.S. Mail and email, at least annually at the start of each school year of the specific or approximate dates of the following activities and provide an opportunity to opt a student out of participating in:

*Collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales or other distribution.

*Administration of any protected information survey not funded in whole or in part by ED.

*Any non-emergency, invasive physical examination or screening as described above.

PPRA Notice and Consent/Opt-Out for Specific Activities

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA), 20 U.S.C.

§ 1232h, requires Hillsdale Local School District to notify you and obtain consent or allow you to opt your child out of participating in certain school activities. These activities include a student survey, analysis, or evaluation that concerns one or more of the following eight areas (“protected information surveys”):

1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student’s parent;
2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student’s family;
3. Sex behavior or attitudes;
4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning

behavior;

5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
7. Religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or parents; or
8. Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.

This requirement also applies to the collection, disclosure or use of student information for marketing purposes (“marketing surveys”), and certain physical exams and screenings.

Parental Involvement

Service to Delinquent and Neglected Children

Armed Forces Recruiters

The school district is required to provide, upon request, the Armed Forces recruiters access to names, addresses, and telephone numbers of students unless the parent requests a prior written consent to the release. Forms are available in the High School Office.

Highly Qualified Teachers

All Hillsdale teachers meet Highly Qualified Teacher (HQT) requirements.

LEP Students

Provisions have been implemented to identify any Limited English Proficient (LEP) students and to make appropriate educational provisions as required by NCLB.

Safe Schools

Hillsdale school buildings meet NCLB criteria for safe schools. Our disciplinary infractions are minimal and not serious.

School Improvement Status

Hillsdale school buildings are academically high achieving and are not subject to School Improvement status as per NCLB.

Annual Testing Program

The Hillsdale School Board of Education has approved an annual testing program for all students. This program is available at the Superintendent's office.

Child Find

Child Find requires the school district to identify, locate, and evaluate children with disabilities. Anyone who suspects a disability in any child living in the Hillsdale School District is asked to contact the Elementary Principal at: 419-368-8700.

For children under two years old, a disability means a delay in adaptive behavior, cognitive ability, communication or sensory, physical, social or emotional development.

For children three to five years old, a disability is determined to exist if documented deficit exists in communication, hearing, or vision, or if a child has motor or social-emotional behavior deficits.

Disabilities of school-age children may include multi-disabled, deaf-blind, deafness, visual, speech or language, orthopedics, severe behavior, cognitive disability, specific learning disability, autism, traumatic brain injury or other health impairments.
